From the Pastor's Desk......

After this weekend we make a departure from Ordinary Time and enter the season of Lent. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday with its stark dramatic ritual of signing the forehead with ashes. There is something in this ritual that speaks to us deeply: the acknowledgment of our human fragility and mortality and our need for reconciliation and conversion. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of a journey: a metaphorical journey through the wastelands and ash heaps of our lives; a journey through deserts where our hunger and thirst for God is awakened; a journey through the wilderness of lurking dangers and luring temptations. All of this needs to be traversed if we are to reach the Promised Land – where unimaginable dreams are realised. The hard and necessary task of our Lenten journey is rewarded by the joy of Easter.

Throughout these 40 days we are schooled in Christian virtue through the disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. In this, both the personal and social dimensions of Christian living are brought to the fore: "During Lent penance should be not only inward and individual, but also outward and social" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, # 110). To this end Project Compassion — a work of the Catholic aid organisation, Caritas International — offers an effective way of showing our solidarity with those burdened by poverty and injustice.

Finally, Lent is a time to prepare for baptism: "In the liturgy and liturgical catechesis of Lent the reminder of baptism already received or the preparation for its reception, as well as the theme of repentance, renew the entire community along with those being prepared to celebrate the paschal mystery, in which each of the elect will share though the sacraments of initiation" (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults [RCIA], #125).

Weekly Reflection:

We are all Called

Today we consider the call to continue the mission of Jesus by engaging in some form of ministry. The first and the last readings are call narratives; the epistle contains a statement of the faith that undergirds our response to our call; the psalm response celebrates the gracious goodness of God that makes all of this possible. Our call is more than a summons to faith; it is a call to ministry. Isaiah is called in order to be sent; the fishermen are called in order to gather others to Jesus. So it is with us. We are called to be sent out to the world. This call comes to us in the ordinariness of life. It will usually come to us as we wash our nets or our dishes, as we teach or raise children, as we prepare a brief for trial or examine a patient; as we repair cars or work at the computer. The call of God comes to us in the ordinariness of life.

We are called to proclaim the message of the resurrection by any and every means possible. Some, like Isaiah and the disciples of Jesus, will witness in open and dramatic ways. They will teach and preach; they will nurse the sick and care for the elderly. Others will witness in less conspicuous ways. They will insist on fair practices in their own workplaces; they will weed out expressions of prejudice and violence so that a new and just world can be fashioned for themselves and for their children. Called in the ordinariness of their lives, they will witness to the death and resurrection in that very ordinariness, thus transforming everything into extraordinariness.

Like Isaiah and Peter, each and every one of us is called. It may not happen through Jesus stepping into our boat, but when we quieten our minds and our hearts enough to really listen, we become aware that God truly is calling to each and every one of us. The call comes to us through our friends; our experiences; our hopes and our fears.

Sometimes we are so afraid of hearing the call that we fill our lives with noise and distractions. We fear that the call will involve hardship, or at the very least: unpopularity. But that's no excuse!

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL Luke 5:1-11

In the other two synoptic gospels — Matthew and Mark — the call of the disciples is one of the first recorded actions of Jesus' adult life. Luke, on the other hand, delays the call until after Jesus' public ministry has commenced. By this stage of the gospel, Jesus has made a public declaration about the nature of his ministry and begun to enact it. In this way, the sort of ministry Jesus will undertake is already established when the disciples are called to join it. It becomes a more conscious decision by the disciples — they know what they're getting in to!

When Peter is overcome by the catch of fish and falls on his knees before Jesus, the response Jesus makes is to simply say, 'Do not be afraid'. This phrase is the most often repeated phrase in the Bible. It appears more than 60 times throughout the Bible – depending on which translation one uses. This is an extraordinary number of times for the one phrase to appear. And the references stretch from the first book, Genesis, to the last, Revelation. It is

God's message to us echoing throughout the Bible: Do not be afraid!
