From the Pastor's Desk.....

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Jesus is not simply saying that love should characterise our way of living, but that we should love in the same manner in which he himself loved. In other words, he offers the template of his own life as the model for us to adopt. That's a tall order! Jesus loved completely, to the point of laying down his life.

Jesus did not start a new religion – Christianity emerged post-resurrection. Jesus lived and remained within the Jewish religion. What he did offer was a new way of interpreting and living out that religious faith that placed love as central.

Throughout the Easter Season we have been holding a number of meetings for various ministries – acolytes, communion ministers, readers, pastoral care etc. I am very grateful for all who have been able to attend. I have been touched by the level of commitment of so many parishioners who by their dedication to their ministry help build up the Body of Christ here at Kippax.

Another important meeting took place on Thursday evening with regard to our parish offering to be part of the sanctuary movement. There was a strong indication of support for this initiative at this meeting. The debate around the treatment of asylum seekers is complex. But as a parish we wish to send a clear message that compassion, founded of the example of Jesus, must always override the politics of fear and the adoption of cruelty as a means of deterrent.

Weekly Reflection:

Love & Community

Everything is new! There is a new law of love, a new heaven and earth that is established in the church, a new depth of communion, and a new glory of God that shines forth from its members.

The new commandment that Jesus announces is more than tolerance or mutual respect. It requires self-sacrificing love. Perhaps the greatest obstacle to this love is the diversity discussed last Sunday. It is hard enough to love those who are like us; how can we possibly love those who are different? And how can we love those who do not love us? It is no wonder that the commandment is called new. It calls for something completely different.

The new commandment given to the disciples – that they are to love one another, 'just as I have loved you' – flows from the revelation that God is love. It is new in the sense that it is called for by the new set of circumstances that is fast approaching. After Jesus' death and return to the Father, the community will no longer have the physical presence of Jesus to make the divine love palpable in their midst. Their own, equally palpable, love for one another must instead take on this role. If this high requirement is fulfilled, if they do indeed love one another after the pattern he has set, then this will signal to outsiders that they are truly his disciples.

"God is love," scripture says, "and whoever abides in love abides in God and God abides in him or her." However, we often miss what that means because of our tendency to romanticise love.

It might best be rendered this way: "God is community, family, parish, friendship, hospitality and whoever abides in these abides in God and God abides in him or her." God is a trinity, a flow of relationships among persons. The realities of dealing with each other in community, at the dinner-table, over a bottle of wine or an argument, not to mention the simple giving and receiving of hospitality are not pure secular experiences but the stuff of church, the place where the life of God flows through us.

JUBILEE OF MERCY

FOUNDATIONS

Mercy is the very foundation of the Church's life. All of her pastoral activity should be caught up in the tenderness she makes present to believers; nothing in her preaching and in her witness to the world can be lacking in mercy. The Church's very credibility is seen in how she shows merciful and compassionate love. The Church "has an endless desire to show mercy". Perhaps we have long since forgotten how to show and live the way of mercy. The temptation, on the one hand, to focus exclusively on justice made us forget that this is only the first, albeit necessary and indispensable step. But the Church needs to go beyond and strive for a higher and more important goal. On the other hand, sad to say, we must admit that the practice of mercy is waning in the wider culture. In some cases the word seems to have dropped out of use. However, without a witness to mercy, life becomes fruitless and sterile, as if sequestered in a barren desert. The time has come for the Church to take up the joyful call to mercy once more. It is time to return to the basics and to bear the weaknesses and struggles of our brothers and sisters. GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:

Alleluia, alleluia! Christ is risen, the Lord of all creation; he has shown pity on all people. Alleluia!

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL Jn 13:31-35

The passage from the Gospel of John actually comes from the Last Supper account, as is indicated by the opening line: 'When Judas had gone'. However, the passage is being used during the postresurrection Easter season. The passage about being glorified can be read in this context as referring to the crucifixion that was, rather than the crucifixion that is still to come in the original setting. The reference that Jesus will not be with the disciples much longer can also be read as an indicator towards the Ascension. It is a clever liturgical use of a gospel passage out of its intended context.
