From the Pastor's Desk.....

An angel is walking down the main street of a country village and is carrying in one hand a bucket of water and in the other a flaming torch. All the people in the village come out of their homes to witness this strange spectacle. One of the people musters up courage to ask the angel what he is doing. The angel answers, "With this touch I will set ablaze the mansions of heaven. And with this bucket of water I will extinguish the fires of hell. Then will we see who really loves God."

The above story illustrates what has so often been the motivation of religious practice: fear of punishment and promise of reward. This type of religion can only be classed as primitive and self-serving. The gospel of love, as preached and lived by Jesus, offers a different paradigm. Love does not seek anything for itself. Rather, it is an outpouring of self. An immeasurable giving that is costly. In Jesus' case, the cost of his love is a total giving of himself to the point of death.

To be a disciple of Jesus is likewise costly. In today's gospel Jesus outlines three criteria for discipleship: the priority of following Jesus over family ties [and friendships], the willingness to take up one's cross, and the relinquishment of possessions. On the surface these demands seem harsh; even a negation of life.

Our only way to understand this "cost of discipleship" is to grasp its paradoxical nature. When we make Jesus the centre of our lives our relationships deepen and become more real, rather than lead to isolation and alienation (which is the result of turning away from God). When we take up our cross we open ourselves to transformation and new life, rather than leading to annihilation, the extinguishment of existence (for our God is a creative, not a destroying God.) Finally, by having the freedom to give up everything for the sake of the Kingdom, we are in turn made rich beyond measure, for everything ultimately comes from God.

The two parables in today's gospel speak of the need to give of our all in following Jesus, for there is no such thing as a part-time Christian. Yes, the gospel is uncompromising, but it is the paradoxical way to freedom and life.

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It is important that we recognize and appreciate the role of fatherhood as we celebrate Fathers Day. My prayers and blessings are with all the dads today.

Weekly Reflection:

Authentic Discipleship

The fleeting nature of life as characterised in the psalm forces us to look at the meaning of life. When the day dawns for us to return to dust, what will we have gained from life? The realisation of our finiteness and the transitory nature of life should help us to set our priorities right and should give us the courage to remain faithful to them.

Discipleship demands that, in the face of all the choices available to us, we keep our priorities straight. In the gospel, Jesus insists that we must be single minded. We must cling to the one thing necessary, and that one thing is authentic discipleship. In choosing Jesus, we choose other things as well. We choose new relationships with the very people to whom we have already been committed. Those who were slaves, or lower class, or employees, or providers of service are now regarded as sisters and brothers in Christ. In choosing Jesus, we also choose the cross. We choose to live in a way that calls us to travel the high road: to forgive offences committed against us; to live simply so that others can simply live; to take responsibility for the moral character of society.

Jesus lived a life of radical generosity and self-surrender and yet never fell into the kind of self-pity that emanates from the sense of having missed out on something. He was never disappointed or bitter that he had given his life over. Nor indeed did he, like Hamlet, turn his renunciation into an existential tragedy, that of the lonely, alienated hero who is outwardly intriguing but not generative. Jesus remained always free, warm, forgiving, non-judgmental, and generative. Moreover, throughout this entire life of self-sacrifice, he always radiated a joy that shocked his contemporaries.

Authentic Christian discipleship carries the hazard of self-sacrifice becoming the bitterness of self-pity when we feel that we have missed out on something.

RESPONSE TO THE PSALM:

In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:

Alleluia, alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia!

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The earliest Christian communities were characterised by a redistribution of all wealth and possessions to ensure that the needs of every single member were met. This was the first interpretation of Jesus' teaching to give up possessions to embrace discipleship.

The first example of counting the cost that Jesus relates is about a man building a house without the means to complete it suffering the fate of his neighbours making fun of him. Whilst the thought of neighbours laughing at our mistake may not be too serious to us, it was a devastating thought in the 1st Century. A social code of honour and shame dominated the world view at the time. To be shamed by your actions or by the actions of others was humiliating and lowered social status. Jesus frequently used the honour-shame code to make his point and challenge social expectations.
