From the Pastor's Desk.....

The parable of the Prodigal Son has been described as the greatest short story ever composed. And that is from a literary point of view. The story has all the dramatic hallmarks that make it an engaging tale which bears retelling time and time again.

On a theological level the story is even more breathtaking. In telling the story, Jesus is obviously having a swipe at the Pharisees in the manner by which he sketches out the character of the older brother. The older brother represents all that is repugnant in the stance of the self-righteous. The younger brother is no angel. He is a fool who through selfishness squanders his father's hard-earned wealth. But the difference between these two characters is that the younger brother comes to his senses. He confronts his folly and is deeply repentant. The older brother remains rigid and unwilling to see from the perspective of his father.

But the story is not only about conversion. It is one of the most revealing and tender images of God that we find in the scriptures. The title of the story 'the prodigal son' is a later appendage. In some ways it detracts from the story itself in that it focuses too much attention on the younger son. It is probably more fitting to be called the parable of the Prodigal Father. The father is reckless. A squanderer. But not from any selfish motive. It is love that the father is reckless with. He squanders his love unstintingly on both his sons. This is the God that Jesus reveals to us. A tender, loving merciful God.

Weekly Reflection:

Parables of the Lost

We are in free love relationship. Jesus is clear about our freedom to choose between life in Him and the path which draws us away. The way human beings grow in love relationship, is by losing and finding. There are three different parables that Jesus tells about losing and finding: The lost sheep, the lost coin, the lost son; the animal world, the physical world, the human world. And in each case you think you have it, you lose it, you rediscover it. And after each is found, a party is thrown. The party is thrown only after the re-discovery. Because you really don't have it until you lose it and re-choose it consciously.

Now that's the human journey.

Jesus tells these parables as a defence against the criticism he is receiving for the welcome he is giving to 'tax collectors (social outcasts) and sinners' and his 'eating with them' – that is, his festive celebration of their being 'found' or 'refound' by God.

In each case, then, the behaviour, response and attitude of the person who loses something images the behaviour, response and attitude of God to human beings 'lost' through sin. Taken together, the parables show that the chief issue at stake is not so much sin and its forgiveness but the loss and recovery of human beings, who are so precious in God's sight. The whole mission of Jesus is to reclaim human lives for God and to show people how much God values them by publicly celebrating that reclamation.

The third parable (the 'Lost Son') introduces a further character – the older brother, whose reaction shows the difficulty human beings have in coming to terms with such a vision of God. The older brother did not think his younger sibling deserved to be treated so indulgently. But what human beings might be thought to 'deserve' does not control the action of God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:

Alleluia, alleluia! God was in Christ, to reconcile the world to himself; and the Good News of reconciliation he has entrusted to us. Alleluia!

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL Lk 15:1-32

The accusation that Jesus eats with sinners would have been considered incredibly insulting and defamatory. In that time, dining was as much a political act as it was a social one.

The three parables that appear in Luke 15 are unique to the gospel of Luke – none of the other gospels use these parables. They are used by the gospel writer to further highlight a theme that runs throughout this gospel: the release and acceptance of those who are oppressed and afflicted. It stems from the declaration of Jesus' mission in Ch. 4 when he reads from the scroll of Isaiah.
