From the Pastor's Desk......

The Place of the Altar

"The altar is Christ!" These ancient words ring with a solid affirmation of the church's insight into the sacredness of the altar. When the altar is consecrated, the oil of chrism is lavishly poured upon the surface of the altar by the bishop. Just as persons are anointed with the oil of chrism at baptism, confirmation and priestly ordination, so the altar is anointed. It becomes Christ.

That is why, when we approach the altar we bow to acknowledge the presence of Christ.

The altar is also understood as table, as the Introduction to the Roman Missal explains:

The altar on which the sacrifice of the cross is made present under sacramental signs is also the table of the Lord at which the people of God are called together to participate in the Mass. As well, the altar is the centre of the thanksgiving that is accomplished through the Eucharist.

Care should be taken that the altar remains uncluttered with unnecessary objects so that it does not resemble a work bench rather than a sacred and dignified symbol.

In their document titled *Our Place of Worship* the Canadian bishops provide a helpful guide to the proportions of the altar.

Intended for the action of a single priest and an assembly, the altar-table should not be elongated but rather square or slightly rectangular, clearly visible without being monumental, and achieve a balance between the scale of the building and the purpose of the altar.

Weekly Reflection:

Conversion is a movement from Hostility to Hospitality

Offering hospitality is a profound social act. When we offer hospitality, we invite another into our world, into our lives. We shift our attention from our own cares and concerns to the needs and comfort of the other. By the act of hospitality we transform strangers into friends and intimates, just as Jesus did with Zacchaeus. The hospitality that Jesus offers dissolves all constraints. Relationships disregard the biased measures of propriety, forging bonds of reconciliation and issuing everyone an invitation to intimacy.

Because of Zacchaeus' evident willingness to welcome the message of Jesus into his life, Jesus prompts Zacchaeus to welcome him into his home. The readiness of Jesus to enter into the house of someone regarded as a sinner causes great scandal among the onlookers. What's more, Jesus is prepared to eat with this man as well – a sign of complete acceptance.

One of the key elements in spiritual conversion is to move from hostility to hospitality. Zacchaeus' statement of intent to amend his sinful ways and adopt in the future a new pattern of life is interpreted as a conversion of heart. But the hospitality this marginalised one provides immediately becomes problematic for the nameless 'they' who mutter and murmur: 'Jesus has gone in to be the guest of a man who is a sinner.' If any party has to undergo conversion in this episode it is the murmuring, criticising 'they'.

The welcome of Zacchaeus meets the welcome of God.

The hospitality that Jesus offers recreates the world from one of insider versus outsider to one of universal inclusivity. Sinners become friends, the lost are found, and all are restored to the rightful place as children not merely of Abraham but of God. The creativity of the creator is matched by the compassion of the re-creator.

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL

In today's passage, the crowds line the streets of Jericho to welcome Jesus with great fanfare but also quickly turn on him when he acts on the message of acceptance and forgiveness that he has been proclaiming throughout his ministry. When we hear this story about Zacchaeus, our focus is normally on the conversion of heart that appears to take place within Zacchaeus. However, his determination to see Jesus from the outset suggests that the conversion has already taken place within Zacchaeus. It is the muttering, grumbling crowd who are called to conversion. Throughout the gospel, the welcome and acceptance Jesus extends to the 'outsider' and the 'sinner' confronts and challenges those who would hold themselves up as being better than these others.
