From the Pastor's Desk.....

In the rock opera Jesus Christ Superstar, King Herod is presented as something of a buffoon, and when Jesus is brought before him on trial he sings, “Prove to me that you're divine/Change my water into wine.”

Of course, Herod misses the point. Jesus' miracles are not conjuring tricks to impress or even to prove his divinity. As the evangelist John states clearly in his gospel the changing of water into wine is a “sign”. The Johannine meaning of the word “sign” carries deep theological meaning. The American scripture scholar Dianne Bergant comments: “The miracles of Jesus were never mere exhibitions of supernatural power. They were always revelations of the inbreaking of the reign of God”.

In this first sign recorded in John's gospel the changing of water into wine is rich in theological significance. For example, the water is contained in vessels set aside for the Jewish rites of purification. From this we can understand the religious significance of the miracle. Jesus is the fulfilment of all the messianic desires of Israel, the wine, that replaces the water set aside for ritual ablutions, now becomes a sign of the kingdom – wine being a symbol of joy.

The signs of Jesus are not meant to impress but to elicit faith. Mary, the mother of the Lord, ignores the seeming rebuke of Jesus and orders the servants to do as Jesus commands. Mary initiates the miracle and it is her faith that makes this possible. Mary's demonstration of her faith in Jesus will later be then taken up by his disciples. But it is Mary who is the primary model of faith.

Over the last three weeks we have celebrated the theme of epiphany, or the manifestation of God in Jesus. Beginning the feast of the Epiphany, followed by the Baptism of the Lord and concluding in today's gospel where we read: “Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.”

Sign of the Kingdom of God

Today's first reading from Isaiah is one of several references in the Old Testament that use wedding imagery – bride and groom – to describe the relationship between God and the people of Israel. The imagery is never that of an 'old married couple' but rather young lovers entering into a new life together full of hope; full of romance; and full of passion. This image of God and the people as bride and groom would not have been lost on the first audiences of today's gospel passage. Immediately, they would have recognised the significance of Jesus' first outing in public ministry being at a wedding feast – at the coming together of God and God's people, Jesus is present!

The changing of the water into wine is a sign of the Kingdom of God where joy and life are in abundance, where shame ends and all tears are wiped away. It is no accident that in John's gospel the mother of Jesus is present at this first sign and remains faithful until the end, right up to the culmination of all the signs: his being lifted up on the cross. The wedding feast at Cana is a taste of the fullness of life we celebrate here every Sunday. The Eucharist is always and everywhere a first course in the eternal banquet of heaven. But it is also an invitation to see beyond the signs, to the faithful relationships that require sacrificial love and years of fidelity.

All parents who sacrifice so much for their children, all spouses who remain faithful and good to their wife or husband, all friends who attend to their companions with devotion and care, share in the Kingdom of God and are the signs of Christ's presence in our world. Every time we are kind, Cana occurs again.

Sometimes these actions can be very lonely and the cost can be high. However, Jesus is always with us especially when the going gets tough.

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL **Jn 2:1-11**

The interplay between Jesus and his mother is very interesting in this gospel event. In this particular gospel it is one of only two occasions that Mary is mentioned: this event at the beginning of Jesus' ministry and then at the foot of the cross as he is crucified. Mary does not ask Jesus to do anything. She simply states, 'They have no wine', Mary ignores his objections and instructs the servants to do whatever Jesus tells them.

The servants are told to fill the enormous water jars with water, draw some into a serving vessel and go and present it to the steward of the household.

The steward comments that the best wine had been kept until the end of the wedding celebration – a clever use of an image for Jesus. Remembering the use of wedding imagery to describe the relationship between the people of Israel and God, the wedding feast is celebration of that relationship, and at the very heart of the celebration and the relationship is Jesus. He is the best wine that is kept until the end – the 'finishing touch' to a magnificent celebration, just as he is the 'finishing touch' to the relationship between God and God's people to that point.
