From the Pastor's Desk......

In today's gospel Jesus tells a parable about a king who cancels the debt owing to him by his servant. The amount is 10,000 talents. A talent was the highest unit of currency of that time and a single unit represented a very large amount, so 10,000 talents was an unbelievable amount, difficult to translate into our own monetary terms. In other words, what Jesus is telling his audience is that the servant in the story had no way of repaying this incredibly huge sum.

The very word "for-give" implies an act of generosity. The king in the parable shows himself not only to be compassionate and merciful, but also generous. When the servant fails to do likewise, the king is outraged.

The point of the parable is clear – as God acts with mercy, compassion and generosity, so too are we meant to act. This can be a pointer to the church in its communication to society. Above all the church is called to announce the good news of the kingdom. Too often the church is perceived as a voice of condemnation, of laying down the law. It would seem to me that it would be wiser for the church, while not in any way compromising its moral and ethical teaching, to be more visible and vocal in its proclamation of a God of love, justice, mercy and forgiveness as the teaching of Jesus constantly underlines. As Jesus reveals to us a God who is tender hearted, it behoves the church to likewise be an icon of love rather than a dispenser of the law.

REFLECTION

Nothing new happens without forgiveness

Jesus left us an example of forgiveness by forgiving his executioners while he hung dying on the cross. Until recently we thought that forgiveness begins with the offender repenting of the offence and then asking for pardon. Today many maintain that reconciliation must begin with the one offended offering forgiveness. This willingness to forgive transforms a victim into a survivor. Such magnanimity might then touch the heart of the offender, who may thus be transformed from being an offender to becoming a friend.

If God has been so generous in forgiving us, surely we should be generous in forgiving others. The process of becoming a forgiving person takes time. For some, it may take a lifetime. Only little by little are our pettiness and indignation reduced and our desire to strike back diminished. We are expected to give the forgiveness that we have been given.

Such forgiveness does not provide an easy way out for offenders, for ultimately justice will prevail. Our unwillingness to forgive can eat away at us, and we can carry hurts from childhood far into adult years. Forgiving others, as difficult as that may be, is in the long run much easier than bearing the weight of resentfulness, vindictiveness and unresolved frustration.

Forgiveness is the only way to free ourselves from the entrapment of the past. We're in need not only of individual forgiveness; we need it on a national, global, and cosmic scale. Old hurts linger long in our memories and are hard to let go. We must each learn how to define ourselves by the present moment—which is all we really have. I will not define myself by what went wrong yesterday when I can draw upon Life and Love right now. Life and Love are what's real. When we forgive we truly begin to be healed.

GOSPEL IN A NUTSHELL Mt 18:21-35

I tell you that you forgive not seven times but seventy times seven.

This gospel passage follows directly from last week's passage. It concludes the whole of Matthew Chapter 18 that deals with sin, forgiveness and reconciliation. Peter's question to Jesus and suggested answer is a reflection of the view that there is a limit to the number of times we should forgive someone. Seven is a significant number in scripture and implies a 'perfect' amount. Even though by his use of seven, Peter is suggesting that he should forgive someone many, many times, Jesus quickly corrects Peter and says not seven, but seventyseven times (or seventy times seven). Jesus plays on the use of the number seven and multiplies it to indicate that one should forgive as many times as is required without keeping count; without keeping score. Peter is suggesting that there is an ideal number of times that one should forgive. Jesus blows this out of the water by saying, take that perfect number of times and multiply it by seventy. There is no perfect number of times to forgive.
