## From the Pastor's desk......

In today's gospel there are wild scenes where Jesus, driven by righteous indignation, overturns the moneychanger's tables and decries the sacrilege of turning God's Temple into a market place. There is nothing wrong with commerce, but it is out of place in the Temple precincts. What seems to stir Jesus to the very bones is the seemingly indifference to the holy.

The Temple was not only a place of pilgrimage and sacrifice but the place of God's abiding presence. It was a place where heaven and earth touched. And the inner chamber of the Temple was described as the Holy of Holies.

In this gospel passage what Jesus seems to rail against most is *forgetfulness*. In the reading from the Book of Exodus God tells his people to *remember*, that he, and no other, was the One who delivered them from the yoke of the Pharaoh. Remembering this liberating event was to be the basis of their faith – a faith that was ratified in the law of the covenant, the Ten Commandments.

Among these commandments is the injunction to "remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy". Again, the emphasis is on remembering. When Jesus calls us into communion he asks us to *do this in memory of him.* 

Yes, commerce and the everyday transactions of life are important and necessary. But everything has its time and place. In our own time the "market place" has become the dominant paradigm displacing the centrality of religious faith and practice. Materialism, consumerism and instant gratification have become the drugs of forgetfulness.

Coming to Mass is meant to remind us of who we truly are. We are the body of Christ and our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. This is our dignity. This is what truly liberates us. *Peace & blessings,*

## ANGER

Anger is a natural emotion and is hardwired into our brains from birth. Not all anger is bad. Anger can give us the energy to fight for a cause, to right a wrong, as we witness with Jesus in cleansing the temple. Without our anger, we may feel weak and vulnerable, like doormats and ready victims for anyone's boots.

This gospel passage must be one of the most commonly misused passages in the Bible. So often it is used as justification for someone losing their temper, or worse, an outrageous temper tantrum, or 'dummy spit'. People will declare in their defence, 'Well, Jesus lost his temper and got angry in the Temple!' They fail to appreciate the difference between their own hot-headedness and the outrage against injustice that was being expressed by Jesus. They also seem to miss the significance of the fact that this was a 'one off' for Jesus!

Jesus' outrage is not so much with the traders and the money-changers as with the whole religious practice and hierarchical structure that has developed to a point where the only way a person can pray in a 'valid' way is to purchase an animal and hand it over to a priest who goes behind a screened wall to sacrifice the animal. The only way to seek God's forgiveness and mercy was to 'buy' it at the Temple. *This* was what outraged Jesus. He could not stomach the injustice nor the barriers that had been erected between the people and their God

The Paschal Mystery is the path to liberation from the crippling vice of anger. Taking up His cross, rather than fighting it, Jesus allowed Himself to be crucified. "Perfect love drives out fear" he says, "so one who fears is not yet perfect in love. We love because He first loved us. If anyone says he loves God, but hates his brother, he is a liar, for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen." (1 Jn 4:18-20)
