From the Pastor's desk...

During the season of Easter we are presented with the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus to his disciples. Their first reactions are interesting: surprise, terror, incredulity.

But their fears turn to joy when they recognize that it is the Lord. It is his presence that brings about this transformation. It is his Shalom – "peace be with you" – that puts the disciples at ease and helps open their eyes to the reality of his presence among them.

But who is he? The disciples know without any doubt that Jesus was killed. Is it his ghost, then, that has appeared to them? Jesus is quick to discount this error of perception. No, Jesus appearance is corporal. It is the same Jesus who was with them during his ministry on earth. And to prove this he invites himself to a meal with them. This is no ghost, no phantom, no disembodied spirit. It is a bodily resurrection. But this same Jesus is different, for he now reveals himself as the Risen One in his glorified body. There is continuity with the Jesus that they had come to know and love, but there is also rupture, for Jesus has broken through the chains of death and has trodden down the powers of hell.

Jesus now reigns in glory. And he appears to his disciple as a friend and companion. This is true for us. The Risen One is just as present to us and he was to his disciples. He wants to be our friend and to give us his peace, his Shalom. When we offer one another the sign of peace during Mass it is the Lord himself who is present to us in one another. It is his words "peace be with you" that we dare to offer in his name. Easter blessings, Gerard

Reflection

'Peace be with you'

In Jesus' teaching and in his life, we see modelled nonviolent, peaceful action. He encourages us to likewise "turn the other cheek" and not return vengeance with vengeance. There is no way to peace, other than through peacemaking itself. But many think we can achieve peace through violence. We say, "We will stop killing by killing." Sadly, that is the way we think, and it is in opposition to all great religious teachers. Our need for immediate control leads us to disconnect the clear unity between means and ends.

Do we have any idea of all the slavery and oppression, all the killing, the torture, all the millions of people who have existed around the edges of every empire so those at the centre of the empire could say they had peace? Every time we build a pyramid, certain people at the top will have their peace. Yet there will be bloody bodies upon which their security is built. Those at the top are usually blind to the price of their false peace.

War is a means of seeking *control*, not a means of seeking peace. *Pax Romana* is the world's way of seeking control and calling it peace. In ancient times, the citizens who lived in the city of Rome thought they had peace. Violence, you see, will always create more violence. It is not real peace. As Pope Paul VI reflected, "If you want peace, work for justice."

We bring peace into our world by being peace ourselves, by connecting with the source of peace within. It means standing up in nonviolent resistance to systems of injustice. It involves learning the skills of nonviolent communication and conflict resolution.

To live nonviolently—both toward humans and nature—requires that we recognize God's image in each living thing. We cannot be violent toward someone or something when we see the divine in them.

Peace be with you.
