# From the Pastor's desk...

"Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture!" Thus God condemns a corrupt monarchy through the voice of the prophet Jeremiah. The Jewish kingdom, established under David, was meant to stand in sharp contrast to the tyrannical kingdoms and empires that surrounded the people of Israel. David was the shepherd-king: one who served both God and his people. But David's heirs soon became corrupted and as a result the people suffered, especially the poor.

The American scripture scholar Walter Brueggemann published a book back in 1978 titled The Prophetic Imagination. He contrasts what he calls the "royal consciousness" with the "prophetic imagination". We see these polarities played out in today's first reading between a corrupt kingship and the prophet Jeremiah. This situation is played out again and again over time and in various cultures. Those in power with vested interests often show an appalling lack of concern for the poor and marginalized.

The role of the prophetic imagination is to challenge the status quo in its complacency and lack of concern. Brueggemann points out three characteristics of the prophetic imagination. First, it names that something is amiss, that things are not according to what God has ordained. Second, the prophetic imagination energizes and engenders hope: things can and should be better. Lastly, the prophet imagination is doxological rather than ideological. That is, it centres on praise of God and not human inspired agenda.

I find these insights helpful in maintaining a spirit of purposefulness in a time when so much in our world appears to be unravelling. More than ever we need the prophetic voice to awaken us to the amazement of God's loving concern and justice.

# Reflection

## **Searching for direction**

There are so many searching people in the world today, people hungering for instruction, good people looking for direction. They may be parents who are sick with grief over the future of a troubled child; a man stripped of his dignity through unemployment; a woman facing a pregnancy alone; elderly people feeling the surge of life leave their declining bodies; people who are angry and confused because they believe that the church is no longer dependable. They are people who are looking for answers and for meaning. They are like sheep without a shepherd, and Jesus looks to us to shepherd them.

There are reliable shepherds within our communities who walk with us in the dark valleys. They are willing to share the dangers through which we pass, even at the risk of their own safety. They do not pit one segment of the community or one theological perspective against another, scattering the sheep and driving them away. Instead, they work to dismantle the walls that divide us. They speak the word that gathers us together. They reconcile us with God and with each other. They may not give us easy answers, but their primary concern is to lead us to Jesus, the one who is our peace.

This ministry is not without its demands and it can take its toll. Jesus knew all about the demands of ministry with other people. When the disciples returned from their first efforts away from Jesus he knew that they needed some time out to debrief, to pray and to re-energise themselves.

Jesus demonstrated how important it is to engage in times of quiet prayer and reflection. When you expend a lot of time and energy in the service of others it is essential to reflect on those experiences, to learn from them and consider what you'd do differently next time. It is also important that any ministry that seeks to be based in the message of Jesus can only remain so if it is fuelled by prayer. Only through prayerful dialogue with God can we learn what God desires for us.
