From the Pastor's desk.......

Both the First Reading and Gospel speak of the virtue of humility. Cardinal Basil Hume, the humble and much loved Benedictine monk who was Archbishop of Westminster from 1976 to 1999, was once asked to name the most important attributes that he looked for in choosing candidates for the priesthood, he answered: "I look for humanity, humility and a sense of humour." These were carefully chosen words, for humanity, humility and humour have their origin in the Latin word humilius, meaning "downto-earth", "having feet planted on the ground".

Being near to the earth, or being grounded, speaks of being in touch: with ourselves, those around us, and with God. The opposite is to have our head in the clouds, and therefore to be out of touch. Humility grounds us in reality. It is a virtue that allows us to value others, that puts us in touch with God, and allows us to own and celebrate our giftedness. Humility is anything but negative.



I wish all the dads a very happy Father's Day. Dads are special. That's why we have Father's Day to remind us of their special place in our lives. However, while society is quick to take commercial advantage of this special day, society is also guilty of undermining the value of Fatherhood. Fatherhood, that enduring and endearing term, needs to regain the currency it rightly deserves.

Fathering is more than biological, more than passing on genes. Fathering, at its core, is relational and cultural. Every child, boy or girl, needs to experience good fathering in order to grow and mature, just as we need good mothering. So today, as we spoil and fuss over the dads, let us also be conscious of the honour and respect deserving of fatherhood.

Reflection

Words Spoken in Truth

We live in a culture that is very quick to lay blame on external factors; some people are very reluctant to accept responsibility for their own actions and look for opportunities to distance themselves from feelings of guilt or even regret. Jesus makes it very clear that evil intentions – the things that make a person 'unclean' – actually come from within. He presents a confronting list of the things that come from within and we may be able to add others relevant to our own time. In our culture of no personal responsibility, Jesus challenges us to rethink just where the buck does stop.

When the word of God has taken root in us, everything becomes a religious practice. This word can come to us through the teachings of our faith, through the example of good people around us, through the wonder and mystery of creation. When it does take hold of us, our inner eye is opened, our hearts are softened, and we turn instinctively to God like a flower turns to the sun. When we are brought to birth in this way, covenant law becomes sacred, religious practices are cherished, and we are filled with the power that saves.

For as long as we blame our most destructive behaviour on evil acting upon us in all its guises, empty promises and powers, then we remain some way from taking the sort of responsibility for the condition of our hearts that might see them fully converted by Christ's saving love. This is not to say that evil does not exist or that it cannot have a powerful effect upon us, quite the opposite. Just as grace builds on love and goodness, evil grows out of estrangement and hatred. As Christians we hold that God has given us free will, and evil's hold on our hearts is often the result of the poor choices and smaller compromises we have made along the way.

Religious practices do not always flow from a deep religious conviction. But once we realise our need for God, these practices become genuine expressions of religious sentiment.


