From the Pastor's desk......

The Age of Enlightenment flourished during the Eighteenth Century. The Age of Enlightenment was not understood in a spiritual sense but rather it represented and championed the light of reason and scientific discovery which were meant to illumine civilization and pave the way to a more bright and optimistic future. In its more radical form the Age of Enlightenment represented the triumph of reason over faith and philosophy over religion. The influence of this movement continues to dominate much of Western thought and values.

However, in today's gospel the opposite is at work: "enlightenment" is understood primarily as a spiritual disposition. In the gospel passage Jesus gives sight to Bartimaeus – a name which means "son of Timaeus". This name is significant as it is an allusion to the book *Timaeus* written by the philosopher Plato. In this book the leading character, Timaeus, claims that philosophy gives us true insight into the nature of the universe and the human person, but this knowledge is restricted to an elite, the 'ordinary man' is metaphorically blind to this 'higher' philosophical knowledge. But in Mark's gospel, it is Timaeus' son who is blind. The message in clear: it is faith in Jesus that provides true insight.

Philosophy and science are, of course, essential for human progress. But without the underlying spiritual illumination humankind is wont to lose its way. In the baptism of children the priest addresses the parents and godparents: "This child of yours has been enlightened by Christ." At each Easter we are reminded that Christ has dispelled the darkness. It is faith that illumines our lives and enables us to use the gift of reason for God's purpose

Reflection

The Blind can See

Bartimaeus is a man who has almost nothing in life. His blindness has made him an outcast. When Jesus encounters Bartimaeus he is sitting by the side of the road – a reject of society sitting off to the side as the world passes him by. There are times in all of our lives when we feel like this: hurt; ashamed; unloved; rejected; cast aside. It is at these moments in our lives that Jesus really wants to 'break through' into our experience.

'What do you want me to do for you?', is the pivotal question in this parable. As Bartimaeus considers his options, he hears the voices of those he might have to look at if he regains his sight. The poor remind him that, 'once before you could see and what you saw disgusted you'. The hungry ask, 'do you have the courage to experience and share my hunger?' The elderly enquire whether he wants to see them be 'put away because they remind him of the frailty of life'. The captives challenge him to see those 'unjustly bound and oppressed'. And finally the Self wants to know, 'Are you willing to look inside yourself to see your beauty and ugliness, darkness and light?'

We are reminded that sight, and the insight that can come from what we see, bestows on us the dignity of having options and the responsibility to do something about what we behold. We are in the position of making choices about what we look at. Not everything in the world needs to be seen. There is enough violence and abuse of human dignity in real life to discourage us from seeking out most fictionalised portrayals of it. We cannot, however, let ourselves off the hook in regard to seeing the world as it is and doing something about creating a better vision of humanity for everyone, everywhere.

If we allow ourselves to hear Jesus' voice calling us to him, then we too can 'throw off our cloak' – our old life – and join him on the road.

If you have a child in year 2 or above and they have not made this sacrament please contact the parish office.


The preparation commences with a formation evening for Parents.
