From the Pastor's desk......

I spy with my little eye. This children's game, often played in the back sit of a family car making a long trip, is a lesson is observation. What do we see? How do we see?

We are constantly observing the world around us. But what do we really see? Do we see creation as something sacred so that we become aware that the very ground that we stand upon is holy. Surely such a perception would help us to tread more gently upon God's earth. And what do we see when we encounter another person: someone created in the very image of God, or is our vision limited to classifying people as friend or foe.

Jesus teaches us to see the world through the eyes of God. The teachings of Jesus are not a list of moral prescriptions but a way of seeing that expands our horizons and enables us to transcend humankind's limited vision of the world

This is not a Pollyanna view of life. Enemies still remain enemies. Yet we are called to love our enemies: Love your enemies and do good to those who hate you (Luke 6.27). Jesus teaches us that our attitude to toward everything that is created by God must be one of love: Be compassionate as your Father in heaven is compassionate (Luke 6.36).

As we learn to see through the eyes of God we begin to live more freely. Our hearts open up to the world around us and our love freely flows as a life-giving stream. This openness and generosity is so beautifully illustrated in today's gospel:

Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back Luke (6.38).

Reflection

Loving Enemies

Some people are easy to love. They get on with their lives and make very little demands of us. Their lives do not impinge on our lives. It takes no effort to treat people whom you like, well – anybody can do that. But what of the more difficult people, or our family members, the ones who demand of us unconditional love that requires us to dig deep into our reserves. The challenge is to treat people you don't like as you would like to be treated yourself. How do we love people who make it difficult for us to love them?

God loves "the bad and the good." Jesus is telling us to love as God loves. Jesus said, 'If you love those who love you, what credit is that? Be kind, be merciful, forgive and do not condemn, for the measure you give out is the measure you will receive'.

Christianity has put a major emphasis on us loving God. But God loved us first. God is the initiator, God is the doer, God is the one who seduces us. It's all about God's initiative. When we experience God's love, then we certainly want to love back the way we have been loved.

The real moral goals of the Gospel--loving enemies, caring for the powerless, overlooking personal offenses, living simply, eschewing riches--can only be achieved through surrender and participation. These have often been ignored or minimized, even though they were clearly Jesus' major points.

God's love sets the standard and the bar of love very, very high, but that does not imply we can't ever reach it. We must aim and ask for this kind of love.

If those are our sentiments, we are not Christians.

Our relationship with God is central to all other relationships. Understanding our vertical relationship with our Creator informs our horizontal relationships with others.

When God commands us to love with our whole being, he clearly spells out his purpose for the relationships he entrusts to us.

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. (Mark 12:30)

Heart - Our words and actions are ultimately a result of what is rooted in our hearts (Lk. 6:45, Prob. 4:23).


Soul - Our being is more than physical, emotional, and intellectual. The soul encompasses all that we are.

Mind - Stewarding our minds asks us to spend time studying God's truth. Knowing, loving, and honouring God with our minds involves diligence.

Strength - means devoted totality. We are to direct all we have at our disposal to the glory of God
