From the Pastor's desk.....

Has justice been done? With the conviction of Cardinal George Pell made public last Tuesday many will be satisfied the verdict delivered by the jury was the right one, others are left wondering.

While our legal system in Australia is robust and independent, it is not perfect. There have been many cases where there has been a miscarriage of justice one recalls the infamous case of the Chamberlains in the early 1980's.

George Pell has made many enemies over the years and his hard-line approach and confrontational style has not helped him. Still, he deserves a fair trial. The Jesuit lawyer, Fr Frank Brennan has cast doubt on the outcome of this particular case.

I was very surprised by the verdict. In fact, I was devastated. My only conclusion is that the jury must have disregarded many of the criticisms so tellingly made by Richter [Pell's defence lawyer] of the complainant's evidence and that, despite the complainant being confused about all manner of things, the jury must nevertheless have thought — as the recent royal commission discussed — that children who are sexually violated do not always remember details of time, place, dress and posture. Although the complainant got all sorts of facts wrong, the jury must have believed that Pell did something dreadful to him. The jurors must have judged the complainant to be honest and reliable even though many of the details he gave were improbable if not impossible. There seems to be no question that the Victorian legal system did its utmost to ensure a fair trial for Pell, given the huge media attention and a perceived public mistrust of the Church. However, the verdict of the jury came as a bombshell.

In the light of the Royal Commission the victims/survivors have understandably had the sympathy of the public. Nevertheless, objectivity should ultimately be the benchmark in any judicial hearing.

Reflection

Universal Truths

Today's gospel is made up of three separate teachings of Jesus that have been put together by the gospel writer to convey a particular message. When taken together, the three teachings all shed light on the way believers influence one another in community. Before we seek to teach another we must ensure we have adequately learned the lesson ourselves. In our post-modern world, the lesson of the hypocrite seeking to remove the speck from their neighbour's eye before removing the log from their own has at times been taken too far and too literally. We are often confronted with a minimalist notion that nobody can be corrected or criticised because one person's opinion is just as good as the next person's. In this view, there is no room for universal truths; no room for authority; no room for an overarching view of the world or a metanarrative - an underlying 'big picture' story for life.

On the surface, the idea that one person's opinion is as valid as any other's seems very democratic and sociable. For some people immersed in the post-modern culture this wash of opinion dressed up as fact is not only confusing but sometimes dangerous. Social norms and even laws can be seen as just another opinion that differs from my own. The opinions of friends and complete strangers on the internet or social networks are held with the same level of legitimacy as established sources of social, moral, legal and religious authority.

Whilst it is proper to question established authority and require accountability and justification, the absence of universal truths and meta-narratives lead us back to the proverb that begins today's gospel: the blind leading the blind.

Our actions towards one another are a reflection of our intentions; good actions come from goodness of the heart.

Our actions show what we are

Saint John the Baptist asked Jesus if he were the Messiah. Our Lord answered by pointing to his works. This is the authentic way to make ourselves known to others and also to know ourselves.

The tree is judged by its fruits. Words may be as charming as possible, clothes as striking as can be, a state of life more holy than one can imagine – all this could beguile us, bring about a wrong judgement or delude us; but actions and conduct cannot lead us into error.

How far we are from possessing the sentiments of the Heart of Jesus! Jules Chevalier msc
