From the Pastor's desk.....

Two tragic events have dominated the news in recent days: the terrorist attack on Muslim worshippers in Christchurch, and the devastating cyclone in Mozambique that has claimed the lives of hundreds of people. These events came suddenly and violently, claiming innocent lives. One was carried out in cold blood; the other was unleased by the forces of nature.

In today's gospel Jesus relates two contemporary events of his time in which violence is summarily visited upon innocent lives. In one instance, the deaths occur under the brutal orders of the Roman Governor: the other is the result of an accident. Jesus underlined their innocence and thus corrects a false view that they had died because of their sins. This primitive theology, which is still around today, maintains that blessings are a sign of God's favour whereas misfortune is a sign of God's dis-favour.

But more importantly Jesus warns against complacency. He tells us that we must deliberately set about getting our lives in order; that there is an urgent need to repent. By implication, we are ultimately responsible for the direction of our lives. Ultimately, we are not subject to the circumstances of life: we can make choices.

Circumstances can limit us, but we still possess freewill. On Thursday evening of last week we held a parish forum in response to crisis that continues to plague our church. It is all-too-tempting to feel powerless in the light of the church's failure to respond adequately to the need for change. One of the reasons why we held this forum was to begin a process whereby our parish community can find and express its voice and seek positive ways of authentically living the gospel. We need to feel empowered by the gospel message.

Circumstances alone do not govern us. We can make lifeaffirming choices for our parish community in spite of the dysfunction within the institutional church.

Reflection

Truth must always be yoked to compassion.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus challenged the prevailing 'purity codes' that separated and classified people. The Jewish religious officials of the day were obsessed with the 'letter of the Law' as it applied to purity observance. Jesus told them that a spirit of compassion was much more important than the blind adherence to the Law. He suggests that it is not the lack of observance of purity codes that makes a person 'unclean' or 'sinful'; rather, it is lack of compassion informing their actions towards others.

Truth must always be yoked to compassion. Growth in our lives (be it intellectual, spiritual, psychological, professional, or moral) should not lead to arrogance, elitism, or the false judgement that we, now so free and enlightened, are stuck among the ignorant and unwashed. Rather any genuine growth should lead to a related growth in compassion, respect, gentleness, and the capacity to be more understanding of what's in opposition to us.

Jesus said as much when he instructed us to speak our truth in parables, lest our speaking it causes more harm than good. In essence, what Jesus tells us is that truth is not a sledge-hammer, and simply having the truth is not enough. Our truth must be right, but so too must be our energy. For the truth to set us free it must come with an equal dose of compassion, otherwise our being right will only lead to more divisiveness inside the community and lots of personal bitterness.

The fig tree is unproductive it has not borne fruit for three years. It symbolizes, time for repenting is running out. The one-year reprieve for the fig tree is an indication to the listeners that their change of heart and change of spirit had better take shape in the very near future.

The call to 'repent' is a call to a complete conversion of heart – to take on an attitude of compassion.

Reparation

Reparation is one of the main purposes of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. All Christians are called by Our Lord himself to walk this path.

It involves many acts, the most important are: Knowledge, adoration, love, satisfaction, prayer, praise, supplication, thanksgiving, imitation, union with Jesus Christ, zeal for his glory, for souls, for mortification. To repair the insults the Heart of Jesus receives, we must in the first place make a serious effort to realise his dignity, his excellence, his greatness, his love, his suffering, the treasures of grace his Heart contains, in a word, whatever makes him worthy of the admiration of heaven and earth. This knowledge is indispensable. How could one render homage to someone whose nature and qualities are unknown? It is impossible to seek enthusiastically something that we hardly even appreciate; and even more so if we do not even know it. How rare are those who make a serious effort to gain this knowledge of the Heart of Jesus.
