From the Pastor's desk......

Easter is meant to be a celebration of joy. But this joy was cut short for worshippers in churches taraeted on Easter Sunday in Sri Lanka. The appalling disregard for human life so evident in such atrocities affects us to the core. We are left deeply saddened and left wondering if there is any hope for our troubled world.

Today's gospel invites us into the mystery of joy and suffering. Jesus appears to his disciples as the risen and glorified Lord; but he still carries the marks of his suffering in his hands and side. The risen Jesus is the crucified Jesus.

Over the Easter weekend we celebrated the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Viail). These are not separate events. The Mass of the Lord's Supper is related to Jesus' death on the Cross – just as in the Easter iconography Jesus is depicted as the victorious Paschal Lamb. The theme of sacrifice and victory go hand in hand. This is the paschal mystery: the death and resurrection of Jesus that is so intimately woven together.

Throughout the Easter Sunday the shadow of the cross remains; but the cross is no longer an instrument of torture and death. By the alchemy of God's transforming love it becomes the tree of life. This is the paradox of the cross of Jesus. Through Christ's death on a tree we gain everlasting life.

Embracing the paradox of the cross, the tree of life, we enter deeply into the paschal mystery. Sharing in Christ's suffering we also share in the joy of his resurrection.

Reflection

Belief should bring about action

The phrase, doubting Thomas, has found its way into our everyday language and condemns Thomas as the one who wouldn't take the word of his fellow disciples but wanted to see the Risen Lord himself.

Thomas wanted to figure things out in his head. He had done too much inner work, too much analysing and explaining. He always needed more data before he could make a move. Then Jesus told Thomas he must put his finger inside the wounds in Jesus' hands and side (John 20:27). Then and only then did Thomas begin to understand what faith is all about.

However, rather than remembering Thomas for his doubt, we should remember Thomas as the one who makes the extraordinary declaration of faith, 'My Lord and my God!' It is Thomas, alone amongst all those who recognise the greatness of Jesus across the four gospels, who acknowledges Jesus as not just the Messiah, but God.

Pope Francis is encouraging a church of doubting Thomases when he tells us that "the church seems like a field hospital" on the edge of a battlefield (as opposed to a country club of saved people) and the "clergy should smell like their sheep" (rather than thinking they smell better). If this could happen, it would change just about everything that we have called church up to now.

Francis of Assisi taught us the importance of living close to the poor, the marginalised, the outcasts in society. The outer poverty, injustice, and absurdity around us mirror our own inner poverty, injustice, and absurdity.

Jesus invites us to stand in solidarity with the poor. The divide between the wealthy and the poor continues to grow. We must come close to real people who are hurting and help bring about change for our world.

This week is an opportune time to examine how generously we offer the gift of mercy to those around us. When


Thomas obstinately declared he would not believe in the risen Christ unless he could see for himself the mark of the nails in His hands and put his fingers into the nail marks and put his hands into His sides, our Lord does not become indignant. He offers mercy. Jesus graciously gives Thomas the very thing Thomas is asking for — a real and personal encounter with Him, the chance to literally touch His sacred wounds so as to heal Thomas from his doubts.

We are in a position to offer mercy when we have experienced it ourselves.

The more deeply we embrace the gift of mercy through regular Confession, the greater will be our capacity to offer mercy to others because we will see ourselves as really truly are —forgiven sinners deeply loved by God, the very hallmarks of mercy?

When we are disbelieved or disrespected, do we respond as Jesus did, with humility and magnanimity and compassion? "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" — in His merciful love.
