From the Pastor's desk......

In the rock opera Jesus Christ Superstar, King Herod is presented as something of a buffoon, and when Jesus is brought before him on trial he sings, "Prove to me that you're divine/change my water into wine."

Of course, Herod misses the point. Jesus' miracles are not conjuring tricks to impress or even to prove his divinity. As the evangelist John states clearly in his gospel the changing of water into wine is a "sign". The johannine meaning of the word "sign" carries deep theological meaning. The American scripture scholar Dianne Bergant comments: "The miracles of Jesus were never mere exhibitions of supernatural power. They were always revelations of the in-breaking of the reign of God".

In this first sign recorded in John's gospel the changing of water into wine is rich in theological significance. For example, the water is contained in vessels set aside for the Jewish rites of purification. From this we can understand the religious significance of the miracle. Jesus is the fulfilment of all the messianic desires of Israel, the wine, that replaces the water set aside for ritual ablutions, now becomes a sign of the kingdom – wine being a symbol of joy.

The signs of Jesus are not meant to impress but to elicit faith. Mary, the mother of the Lord, ignores the seeming rebuke of Jesus and orders the servants to do as Jesus commands. Mary initiates the miracle and it is her faith that makes this possible. Mary's demonstration of her faith in Jesus will later be then taken up by his disciples. But it is Mary who is the primary model of faith.

Over the last three weeks we have celebrated the theme of epiphany, or the manifestation of God in Jesus. Beginning the feast of the Epiphany, followed by the Baptism of the Lord and concluding in today's gospel where we read: "Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him."

Reflection

Abundance

The changing of the water into wine is a sign of the Kingdom of God where joy and life are in abundance, where shame ends and all tears are wiped away.

The flow of grace through us is largely blocked when we are living inside a worldview of scarcity, a feeling that there's just not enough: enough of God, enough of me, enough food, enough health care to go around, enough mercy to include and forgive all faults. The problem is exacerbated by the fact that the human mind is actually *incapable of imagining* anything infinite or eternal. So it cannot imagine an infinite love or a God whose "love is everlasting," as the Psalms continually shout. In other words, the mind of itself cannot know God.

Our unhealthy economics and politics persist because even Christians largely operate out of a worldview of scarcity: there is not enough land, water, money, and housing for all of us. A saint always knows that there is more than enough for our need but never enough for our greed. In the midst of the structural stinginess and over-consumption of our present world, how do we possibly change consciousness and teach the mind to operate from mercy and graciousness? Even the churches tend to be stingy with grace and mercy, as Pope Francis continues to point out.

Only our personal experiences of unconditional, unearned, and infinite love and forgiveness can move us from the normal worldview of scarcity to the divine world of infinite abundance. That's when the doors of mercy blow wide open! That's when we begin to understand the scale-breaking nature of the Gospel.

The wedding feast at Cana is a taste of the fullness of life we celebrate in the Eucharist every Sunday.

Stewardship


The Definition of Stewardship

The Catechism of the Catholic Church uses the words "steward" and "stewardship" in several ways: No. 859, "[The Apostles are] 'stewards of the mysteries of God"; 893, "The bishop is the steward of the grace"; 952, "A Christian is a steward of the Lord's goods"; 1117, "The Church . . . is the faithful steward of God's mysteries"; 2238, "God has made [those in authority] stewards of his gifts"; 2280, "We are stewards, not owners, of the life God has entrusted to us"; and Nos. 373, 2042, 2404, 2417 and 2457 all deal with taking care of the planet as entrusted by God to man. Merriam-Webster defines stewardship as: "The careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care."

When it comes to stewardship, then, it would be wise for us to remember that no one is an absolute owner of anything, not even his or her own self. Everything we have in life comes from God, so everything is a blessing and everything is on loan. We are stewards of temporal realities: our time, our talent, and our treasure.

A simple rule of thumb could be helpful: the more you give, the happier you are; the more you serve, the holier you become.
