From the Pastor's desk.....

"Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." This saying of Jesus that we hear in today's gospel refers to the itinerant nature of his ministry. Jesus was always on the move, going from town to town, preaching the kingdom of God and healing the afflicted.

The above saying of Jesus might equally apply to today's world in which there are millions of displaced peoples. Last Sunday the St John the Apostle Refugee Resettlement Committee hosted a film afternoon showing the documentary 'A World of Stories'. The film followed the lives of several asylum seekers who are now making a valuable contribution to Australian society. However, it was equally disturbing to realise the continuing effects of trauma caused by years of living locked in detention.

Too often refugees and asylum seekers have not received the hospitality deserving of their plight and circumstances. It was in the context of this failure to offer hospitality that prompted Jesus to remark "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." The disciples had just left a Samaritan town in which they were unwelcomed. James and John wanted to extract vengeance: "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" But Jesus rebukes them for such outlandish thoughts. No, in the face of suspicion and hostility Jesus will continue to show by his words and actions that God's modus operandi is one of divine gracious hospitality. Indeed, the theme of God's hospitality is a persistent motif in Luke's gospel.

Reflection

Live Simply

No matter how much we try to ignore it, or play it down, the call to simplicity of lifestyle and detachment are important elements in the teaching of Jesus and the way he lived his own life.

In Luke's gospel and in his second volume, The Acts of the Apostles, the obligations of the haves to the have-nots are regularly underlined. Scholars think Luke's gospel keeps this teaching most alive because it was a community divided by wealth.

In today's Gospel this obligation is put in its starkest form. To 'bury the dead' in first-century Palestine sometimes meant having to take on their responsibilities – farm, fishing or family. To have 'nowhere to lay one's head' gave as much freedom then as it does today; and to be detached, without regret, has always been a sign of God's kingdom.

There is no dignity in poverty and most people who are poor, while they can be rich in the best human values, do not want to stay poor. What they deserve, and what all Christians should want, is economic and social justice. We are not at liberty to follow Jesus and watch the rich get fatter and all-consuming while the poor pay the price for unchecked greed.

Some Christians are given the gift of living very simply and to the degree that this gift brings life to them, and those around them, it is a wonderful sign of God's kingdom. All the rest of us, who struggle to embrace this gift, or a desire to ever want it, must face up to the challenge of Jesus' teaching here. But it's not just about money. We are also called to detach ourselves from memories, which can be cluttered with anger and revenge; from the demands of work which keep us from being with those we love; and to be generous with our time, talent, hospitality and compassion.

May our generation show the kingdom of God most visibly in the way we live simply, fight for justice for all people everywhere, and the detachment we have to everything but the essentials.

"The Sacred Heart of Jesus is the quintessence of the Christian faith; the epitome and substantial summary of the whole of religion.

The Christian religion is a work of love in its beginning, development and end; the Christian religion whose history is found wholly and entirely in the sublime statement: "God so loved the world" (John 3:16), that is, we believe that, in the work of God, the Heart has done everything; the Christian religion, finally, whose whole morality is contained in the single word, Diliges: You shall love; that is, you shall render love for love, you will give me your heart in exchange for all that mine has done for you; the Christian religion, we can say, could not be identified so completely with any other devotion as with devotion to the Sacred Heart" (Cardinal Pie).
