From the Pastor's desk......

At the beginning of the Baptismal rite the priests says to the parents and godparents: "You have asked to have your child baptised. In so doing you are accepting the responsibility to train her/him in the practice of the faith, to teach her/him to love God and neighbour..." In today's gospel Jesus spells out what it means to love God and neighbour in the telling of the parable of the Good Samaritan. This is the heart of our religion: love. Going to the aid of someone in need is one thing, but to put one's life at risk is another. And that is what the Good Samaritan does by stopping on a route notorious for ambushing bandits. Furthermore, the Good Samaritan reaches out to the aid of his enemy - as Jews and Samaritans were at that time.

On the one level, it is a beautiful story of compassion and mercy. That is, if we just read it as a story. To apply this teaching to our lives is a different matter. It means, at times, that we put ourselves at risk, as the Good Samaritan does. This is the costly demand of love. Not for the fainthearted.

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My third term of three years finishes at the end of next year (I was appointed parish priest at the beginning of 2012). However, I have been granted a sabbatical that I will begin next year. I will remain as parish priest until the end of 2020 but in my absence Fr. Kimi will be assisted by Fr. Nithan MSC. Nithan is a newly ordained presbyter from the MSC Indian Province. We expect Nithan to arrive in Australia sometime soon and take up his role as assistant priest at Kippax.

Reflection

Who am I a Neighbour to?

The story of the Good Samaritan in Luke's Gospel is about the movement from an individualised faith, which can think that it is just 'me and Jesus against the world', to a faith that goes out to the world acting mercifully and justly. This parable is about what we see, whom we love, and what we want to do about it.

Christian tradition teaches us that mercy and justice are intertwined. The Good Samaritan is not 'good' because he has the money to act on what he sees. His greatness is that he has eyes to see it at all. To really see it. The priest and the morality-teaching Levite pretend it's not happening and walk on the other side of the road. But the most unlikely, the least liked person in Israel – a Samaritan – has the view of mercy.

Authentic love is of one piece. How you love anything is how you love everything. Jesus commands us to "Love our neighbours as we love ourselves," and he connects the two great commandments of love of God and love of neighbour, saying they are "like" one another (Matthew 22:39). So often, we think this means to love our neighbour with the same amount of love—as much as we love ourselves—when it really means that it is the same Source and the same Love that allows each of us to love our self, others, and God at the same time! That is unfortunately not the way most people understand love, compassion, and forgiveness—yet it is the only way they ever work. How you love is how you have accessed Love.

The example of the Good Samaritan should enliven our charity, mercy and justice; and it should challenge us to see clearly who needs to be carried with us on the Gospel road.

Heart Spirituality

Compassion

Our love of neighbour should be tenderhearted and compassionate. The Samaritan should be our model. Along the road he meets a wounded man, half dead, stripped, dying of hunger. He is stirred at the sight, and his heart touched with compassion (Lk. 10:33). Let us not close our heart to pity, when along life's road we come across a person wounded by sorrow, bruised by ingratitude, calumny or sin, prostrate in the mud of a disorderly life, or a poor person lacking everything, or a needy family.

Like the Samaritan, let us draw near to these unfortunate people, and do everything in our power to comfort them. Do we conduct ourselves in this way? Do we not on the contrary imitate the hardness of heart of the men in the gospel towards the wounded man?


Stewardship
