FROM THE SIDE-DESK

At the end of this year, I will complete my three-year appointment at Kippax parish. Two of those years as assistant priest and this year as parish administrator while Fr. Gerard has been on sabbatical leave.

Last Thursday afternoon (15 October), I met with Fr. Chris McPhee, Provincial Superior of the MSC in Australia. During our meeting, Chris informed me that following the deliberation of his provincial council, he will be recommending to Archbishop Christopher Prowse that I be appointed Parish Priest of St John the Apostle Parish - Kippax for a term of three years commencing 1st January 2021. Fr. Gerard has been appointed parish priest of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Parish (Randwick, NSW).

Chris asked how I felt about my appointment. I told him that if I never progressed further than being an assistant priest for the rest of ordained ministry, I would be very happy. The reason for my reluctance is that as an assistant priest I have the opportunity to do what attracted me to ordained ministry; the pastoral aspect. I am able to leave the administrative aspect of ministry to the parish priest.

However, over the last three years, I recognise how blessed we are at Kippax to have Marian and Sharon in the parish administration team with their experience in the day-to-day operation of the parish but also helping coordinate the pastoral aspects of parish ministry. We have members of the pastoral council and liturgy, finance and other parish committees who are supportive and have the spiritual and pastoral care of our community at heart. So rather than taking me away from what I enjoy about ordained ministry, I am surrounded and feel encouraged in my own calling by so many of you who live our shared baptismal call to priesthood. You will help set the foundation of my ministry as a parish priest.

This as many of you know, will be my first appointment as parish priest, and together with Fr Michael, I look forward to your support and working in collaboration with you over the next three years.

Reflection

The Cost of Love

In today's Gospel, Jesus does not promise us that the love of God and neighbour is going to cost us nothing. Jesus' law of love involves sacrifice for us individually and as a nation. Through the acceptance of this teaching we are committing ourselves to being our neighbour's keeper. In another part of the same Gospel, Jesus tells us that 'those to whom much has been given, much will be required.' Sadly, many of us want the good life for ourselves, while doing very little to help other countries become more liveable, and then we can reject people who want to share in the blessings we have worked for and inherited.

No pressing issue in the Western World, it seems to me, invites such hysteria as does immigration. Until recently, most western countries have been good in offering hospitality to people who have chosen to leave, or have had to flee their country of birth. Given our comparative wealth this hospitality is entirely appropriate. And it is also appropriate for our countries to have a threshold number for the sake of the common good.

The Gospel of Matthew gives us the story of Mary, Joseph and Jesus being forced to flee Israel for Egypt as refugees. If the Holy Family were coming our way these days, they might be sent back to King Herod. May the Eucharist change our hearts to enable our faith to act justly toward all people everywhere. May our goodness and hospitality mirror on earth the welcome we hope to enjoy from Jesus, Mary and Joseph in the kingdom which is promised to all, irrespective of where any of us has been born.

Today's gospel message is so beautiful and so challenging, it bears repeating again and again. It is Christ's response to a question about which commandment is greatest. His answer reveals both the greatest and the second greatest commandments.

He says, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind... The second is like it: you shall love your neighbour as yourself."

How is the second like the first? What do the two commands have in common? Love.

BELCONNEN YOUTH


Agape - Youth Group High school students in Years 7 to 12 First and Third Sundays after the 6:00pm Mass Our next gathering – 1 November
