Reflection

Mary's Yes

Mary's resounding "Yes" to the angel Gabriel is a gamechanger, not only in the context of her own life but in the broader scope of religious history.

In a world where choices often reflect personal ambition and the pursuit of individual happiness, Mary's affirmative response stands as a radical departure from the norm. Her "Yes" is not merely an acknowledgment of a divine plan; it is a transformative surrender of personal control, a relinguishing of the expected trajectory of her life in favour of a higher purpose.

In the tapestry of faith, Mary's "Yes" represents a turning point, a decisive moment that alters the course of salvation history. It challenges the prevailing notion that humanity will always bend to the dictates of self-interest. Mary's consent signifies a profound trust in the divine, an acceptance of a role that transcends societal expectations and personal aspirations.

From a modern perspective, where autonomy and selfdetermination often take precedence, Mary's "Yes" serves as an inspiring example. It prompts us to reconsider the way we approach decision-making, urging us to examine whether our choices are driven solely by individual desires or if there is room for a greater, more transcendent purpose.

Mary's affirmative response echoes through the ages as an invitation to embrace a different paradigm of faith-one that requires surrender and trust beyond the boundaries of our own understanding. It challenges us to recognize that sometimes the most significant shifts in our lives come not from clinging to control but from releasing it, allowing a divine plan to unfold.

In the grand narrative of Luke's gospel, Mary's "Yes" is a game-changer that sets in motion the unfolding of God's redemptive plan. It beckons us to reflect on our own capacity to say "Yes" to the unexpected, the challenging, and the transformative moments that may redefine the trajectory of our lives. Mary's willingness to be a vessel for divine purpose challenges us to consider whether we, too, are ready to be game-changers in our own faith journey.

No Room

So, there was no room at the inn? True! But what the Evangelist wants us to really see is the picture of pure peace, pure joy: "She wrapped her first-born Son is swaddling clothes and laid him in a manager" (Luke 2:7). There are reasons why it was necessary that there be no room at the inn, and why there had to be some other place. The inn was the last place in the world for the birth of the Lord.

Why then was the inn crowded? Because of the census, the eschatological massing of the *"whole world"* in centres of registration, to be numbered, to be identified with the structure of imperial power. The purpose of the census: to discover those who were to be taxed. To find out those who were eligible for service in the armies of the empire.

Nor are the tidings of great joy announced in the crowded inn. News becomes merely a new noise in the mind, briefly replacing the noise that went before it and yielding to the noise that comes after it, so that eventually everything blends into the same monotonous and meaningless rumour. News? There is so much news that there is no room left for the true tidings, the "Good News," *the Great Joy.* So, the Great Joy is announced, in silence, loneliness and darkness, to shepherds "living in the fields". We live in the time of no room. The time when everyone is obsessed with lack of time, lack of space. There is no room for nature. No room for quiet. No room for solitude. No room for thought. No room for attention, for the awareness of our state. No room for God.
