We alerted them to our arrival and then when they spilled out of their house we left our bundles on their driveway. Once they examined what we had put there we could tell that they were delighted, especially the children. It made us feel like Santa. To our delight, we found out that our family from El Salvador have a little "Aussie" born during April. Our asylum seeker family is coping very well but, the uncertainty of their existence here in Australia must weigh heavy.

Our brief, at a distance, visits were also a little bitter sweet. We could not accept their offers of hospitality. Like many of us, there is a craving for closer contact with friends and family than the telephone or computer. But, when your English language is still developing communicating via phone and or email is even more difficult.
