Father Peter Wood, an avid reader and founder of Parish Book Club was a passionate stamp collector. Part of his collection accompanied him to St John the Apostle, Kippax. "It's enough for now," he would say. "But someday I would like to have a stamp room."

I, like many, kept an eye out for stamps on letters and parcels and helped to build his collection. Philately is not just the collecting of stamps. It is all things postal. Eather Peter introduced me to the world of pictorial

postal. Father Peter introduced me to the world of pictorial postmarks. These small, insignificant, and often overlooked impressions from an inked rubber stamp commemorate events, provide links to a town's history, and make great souvenirs. Those depicted here are linked to the history of the Church in Australia.

A couple of years after Father Peter left the Parish, I had the pleasure of visiting him in Moonah, Tasmania. He greeted me with a beaming smile, ushered me into the presbytery hallway, and said, "Come this way." I followed him, not knowing what to expect. He opened a door and said, "Take a look!" He had a STAMP room!!!

Fr. Peter Wood msc was Acting Parish Priest in 2007 when Fr. Michael Fallon msc Parish Priest was on Sabbatical in Rome. Fr Peter died on 29 August 2018.

A postmark commemorating the Golden Jubilee of St John the Apostle, Kippax is available on request from the post office at Kippax Shopping Centre until the end of the year. A postmark usually includes the name of the post office or mail centre that receives the mail. This pictorial postmark bears the place name, Holt...that makes it doubly special.

## Treasures from the Archives

## The Four Evangelists

This year commemorates 50 years of the Parish of St John the Apostle, Kippax. There are several saints named John – St John the Apostle, is one of the Four Evangelists or writers of the Gospels, the others being St Matthew, St Mark, and St Luke. In art the Four Evangelists are represented by: a winged man or angel (Matthew), a winged lion (Mark), a winged ox (Luke), and an eagle (John), and almost always appear together as a group.

As in all things artistic within the Church each symbol has meaning. One source of the Evangelists' symbols may be from the final book of the New Testament (Rev 4, 6-8) – a description of a scene in which the throne of God is surrounded by four living creatures – one like a lion, one like an ox, one like an eagle and one with the face of a man. The creatures never stopped praising God with the words:

Holy, holy, holy, the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come.

Early Christian writers ascribed these symbols to the Evangelists according to what they saw as the essence of each Gospel. St Matthew was represented by the man/angel as his Gospel emphasised the humanity of Jesus. St Mark was given the lion as his Gospel emphasised the kingship of Jesus. St Luke's Gospel highlighted the sacrificial aspects of Jesus' life and so the ox was chosen. St John was ascribed the eagle because his Gospel was considered the most soaring and revelatory. An alternative explanation has Kingship as its theme – Jesus' kingship of creation as the centre surrounded by man (king of men) lion (king of wild animals), ox (king of tame animals) and eagle (king of birds).

The Bathurst Diocesan Archives holds a set of gold vestments hand-embroidered with the symbols of the Evangelists. They were made in Ireland and feature the ox and lion on the front and eagle and man/angel on the back. They date from the mid-twentieth century and are in the *Roman* or *fiddle-back style*.

### Blessed Peter To Rot Feast Day 7 July 2022

In August 1997 I returned to Vunapope Mission in East New Britain Province (ENB) Papua New Guinea after the volcanic eruption in Rabual – Provençal City of East New Britain. The occasion was to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of my former principal Sr Bernadette MSC and the official opening and blessing of the Peter To Rot Memorial Church at Rakunai ENB PNG.

The island of East New Britain has a very close association to the MSC. The mission station Vunapope where I worked from 1985–1988, was established by the German MSC and our Australian MSC had a secondary school 15 kms down the road from Vunapope for boys aged15–18.

Peter To Rot was born on 5 March 1912 on the New Pomerania island in the then-German New Guinea (New Britain) as the third of six children to Angelo Tu Puia (the well-respected village chief) and Maria Ia Tumul who had both converted to Roman Catholicism in 1898.

His father taught him the basics of catechism and sent him to the local mission school in 1919 despite the fact that education was not an obligation at the time. He was quite agile in climbing coconut trees and he was more than willing to do this to acquire coconuts for older villages. It was rare for him to be mischievous at school, but he was honest and quick to help those in need. In 1930 the parish priest of Rakunai, Father Laufer msc, asked his father if he would allow To Rot to start his studies for the priesthood. His father said that the time was not right for that but it would be more than appropriate if his son studied to become a catechist. In 1930 he began his studies at Saint Paul's College of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart in Taliligap after which he was commissioned as a catechist for the parish of Rakunai in 1933 when the local bishop gave him the catechist's cross. To Rot then returned to his village where he would go on to aid Father Laufer. He was an excellent teacher and an organizer of classes for people, and he had a Bible on his person at all times.

On 11 November 1936 he married Paula la Varpit and the couple went on to have three children; one died as an infant, and another died soon after the war. His final child lived into old age and was born after To Rot's death. The pair were married in a church though some of the local and traditional customs were observed.

Once the Japanese forces occupied the nation in March 1942 (forcing an Australian garrison out) their soldiers interned all the foreign missionaries though remained indifferent to religion overall. The parish priest left To Rot in charge of his parish and he became its active leader because of this. In this role he cared for those who were ill and poor while also aiming to better educate converts. Towards late 1943 the Japanese authorities restricted religious services and a few months later forbade them in full. But To Rot continued to hold them in secret and did not fear the implications on his own life despite the fear of those around him. The destruction of the church a short while later saw him build a "bush church" outside the village to hold secret services; he kept records of baptisms and weddings there.

To Rot was sentenced to two months' imprisonment in the Vunaiara concentration camp. On one occasion his wife and two children came to visit him, and she begged him to give up being a catechist so he would remain safe. But To Rot was adamant he would not relinguish his responsibilities to the people. On the date of his death, he said to his mother: "the police told me that, this evening, a Japanese doctor will come to give me some medicine. Surprising since I am not sick. I suspect this is a trick." He told his wife to bring his cross and good clothes so he could go to God dressed in proper attire.

He was given lethal injection in 1945 and then given something to drink. But the guards saw that the poison was slow so made him lie down while the doctor covered his mouth; he was stricken with convulsions and was held down as he died while being struck on the back of his neck with a beam.

His beatification received approval from Pope John Paul II on 2 April 1993 after the pope confirmed that To Rot had been killed "in odium fidei" (in hatred of the faith). John Paul II beatified To Rot on 17 January 1995 in Port Moresby while on his visit to Papua New Guinea.



#### From the Archdiocese – 17 June 2021

#### Canberra Catholic Schools Building Fund (CCSBF)

The parishes of Canberra have been long term supporters of the CCSBF since its inception.

The donations received by the CCSBF totalled \$4.7 million in 2020, of which the parishes contributed \$128,119.

The Catholic Education Commission has approved parishes ceasing their donations as from 1/7/21. This decision was also approved by the Archdiocesan Finance Council and the Trustees at their meetings earlier in the year.

#### Planned Giving Tax Receipts

In the July 2021 KIT we advised you that there would no longer be a tax component applied to planned giving donations.

#### KIT July 2021 p. 14

Annually the Archdiocese's charges parishes a levy for the Canberra Catholic Schools Building Fund [CCSBF], which for our parish is around \$10,000.

However, from the 1 July 2021 the Archdiocese will no longer charged this fee. This means that the parish expenditure will decrease by \$10,000 per year.

However, this decision to not levy the CCSBF fee has implications for parishioner's tax benefits. As the CCSBF is a recognised charity with the ATO it is that percentage ratio of the planned giving that carries a tax benefit. This means that in the future there will no longer be a tax benefit applied to planned giving.

As there is now no need to issue tax receipts the SJA Finance Council took the decision to align our planned giving year with our financial year, January–December. We will issue Giving Statements from 2 January–25 December 2022 in January 2023. However, you can request a copy of your giving at any time, please telephone the parish office to request a giving statement.

Total expenditure is expected to be between \$166,000 and \$200,000. To fund these projects, we have applied and been approved a loan of \$200,000 from the Catholic Development Fund.
