

Time out for reflection



In the nine days leading up to the 16 June – the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, MSC's across the Province were given a Novena to the Sacred Heart to pray. Each day had a particular intention and what follows is the intention for each of those days.

7 JUNE *Gratitude*

On this first day of the novena, we contemplate the mystery of the love of God who loves us gratuitously. God who comes to us, not to condemn, but to forgive and save. Every breath, every beat of our heart is a sign of his love for each of us. Today, let us reserve some time in our day to observe the infinity of good things that have happened to us since the moment we woke up: having a place to live, having something to eat, having clothes to wear, being healthy, etc.

Let us give thanks for all these blessings and ask God for the grace to be more grateful people.

8 JUNE *Empathy*

On this second day of the novena, let us open our ears and our hearts to the voices of the suffering people around us. Let us try to simply listen to those close to us, without judgements or solutions, putting ourselves in their shoes and trying to understand them mercifully.

9 JUNE *Prayer*

Today we are going to try to set aside a moment for personal prayer, trying to discern the voice of God where he reveals himself: in the bible, in the people around us, in the facts of life. Let us try to listen to God's voice and follow what the Father leads us to, so that we can become the person God dreams of us being.

10 JUNE *Serve*

The baptism of Jesus was the beginning of his public life. What gifts and talents has God given us to serve others? Today let us ask God to free us from the temptation to think we have nothing to offer.

11 JUNE *Generosity*

This day can be an excellent occasion to revisit the theme of "works of mercy" and to challenge yourself to live them. How about today, in a very practical way, we live love without expecting anything in return? Feed the hungry, teach the ignorant, visit the sick, etc.

12 JUNE *Console*

There are a lot of lonely people in the world. Sometimes, very close to us, we can find someone in this situation. Today we are going to make a conscious effort to be with someone in their suffering.

13 JUNE *Repair*

Take a close look at the people in the places where you live, work, or study. Do you realise that there is some injustice that needs to be righted?

What can you do to remedy this situation.

14 JUNE *Reconciliation*

Perhaps we have experienced some frustrations in our life. Today, we are going to try to open ourselves up to reconciliation: be it forgiving that person who has hurt us, be it forgiving ourselves, or even reconciling with that event which life has put us through and that has hurt us.

15 JUNE *Love*

Today, let us thank the Lord for all the people in this life by whom we feel loved. Even with their contradictions and imperfections, they were the ones who taught us to love. Today, let their example inspire us to love everyone, not just those who think or behave like us. Loving first and not expecting to be loved and respected in return.

16 JUNE*Feast of the Sacred Heart*

Lord Jesus, we praise you and celebrate the love of your heart. Today, we want to give you all the honour, glory, and gratitude we can.

Blessed life that prefers to die than to kill!

Blessed Heart that remains open to everyone!

Blessed pierced side, which is not a wound, but an open door to Paradise, which opens to all who love as you loved! May we drink from your source, our Saviour!



May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be everywhere loved...forever!



1894-1895
HOPi INDIAN PRISONERS

Hopi "hostiles," as they were called by the U.S. Army, refused to farm as instructed by government officials and opposed the forced separation from their children, who were required to attend government boarding schools. Both offenses stemmed from resistance to U.S. policies designed to erase Native American language, religion and culture. As a result, 19 Hopi men, elders in their community, were arrested in November of 1894 and imprisoned on Alcatraz until September of 1895.

Their family members did not know if they were alive or dead. Two of the prisoners' wives gave birth while their husbands were imprisoned. On January 4th, 1895, the San Francisco Call published a story under the headline, "A Batch of Nineteen murderous-looking Apache Indians landed at Alcatraz Island yesterday morning...Crafty redskins who refused to live the civilized ways of the white men." The article misidentified the 19 men and was filled with stereotypes.

Archbishop Christopher Prowse gave a blessing to all present and spoke briefly of the 44 years of service given at Bruce. He commented on the 55,000 babies delivered there.

A mobile BBQ served roasts, vegetables and salads; those in the crowd managed their disposable plates with little people running around, all enjoying themselves.

I can only add my feelings of gratitude for the 30 years of working at Calvary. I grew both professionally and emotionally, made some valued friendships and enjoyed a special career. I feel honoured to have worked there for thirty years.

ACT

See, Judge, Act, is a theological method which aids in character development. It is based on St Thomas Aquinas' theology of the Virtue of Prudence. A model that can be used in any situation throughout the life cycle. A simple method which helps us to stop, stand back from a situation and reflect on it before we jump in and act. This process helps us to develop critical judgement about situations, events, and structures. Often the three stages overlap and intermingle.

SEE

Seeing is an inductive method that starts from reality. It aims at understanding the reality in its social, political, economic, and cultural dimensions.

JUDGE

Theological Reflection explores the experience and its deeper analysis, in dialogue with the religious tradition. From this conversation, we gain new insights and meanings. Two important sources of this tradition are the Scriptures and Catholic Social Teaching.

ACT

Gathered information (Seeing) and analysis and theological reflection (Judging) lead to ideas on how we can act upon the observed phenomenon in order to change the situation and address its root causes. Our aim here should be doing the will of God and changing the reality so as to bring it closer to the Reign of God.



So, it is with Genesis the first book of the bible which records the beginning of time, life, sin, salvation, the human race and the Hebrew nation. Big subjects.
