

## Time for Reflection

## KINDNESS



Defining Heart Spirituality is challenging, as it is more a lived experience than something easily articulated in words. However, James Maher msc offers a profound description:

"A Spirituality of the Heart is a way of living – a way of being in the world...a journey to be travelled (with others),...an energy that sustains and moves us, a dance in which we are participating... a way of being in the world, in relationship to self, others and God; a way of coming to rest within ourselves, at our deepest centre." James Maher msc

Jules Chevalier, through his prayer and devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, came to understand that the Heart of Jesus is the Heart with which God loves humanity, and the entirety of creation. Recognizing that the people of his time were distancing themselves from God, Jules envisioned the regeneration of society through the love, compassion, mercy, and kindness found in the Heart of Jesus. Kindness became Jules Chevalier's way of embodying God's heart on earth.

Kindness, a virtue valued in both religious and secular contexts, can be broadly defined as "the disposition of being considerate, service-minded, and concerned for others' well-being, without desiring or expecting anything in return."

Although kindness and compassion are related, they are distinct. Kindness involves a two-way interaction, whereas compassion can be directed outward or inward and is more about feeling than action.

Kindness is a visible behaviour that others can observe. It encompasses qualities such as affection, warmth, and playfulness. When we are kind, we can admit our wrongdoing and reconnect with others, modelling openness and humility.

Compassion, on the other hand, is an inner experience. It can be directed toward others or oneself (self-compassion) and is characterized by sympathy, empathy, and concern. Compassion emphasizes nonjudgmental thinking, validation, distress tolerance, and acceptance. It is oriented toward healing, alleviating suffering, and acknowledging the universal nature of human suffering.

## Time for Reflection

Kindness is powerful. A small act of kindness can change a life in an instant. We often underestimate our ability to transform someone else's day with a word of encouragement, a smile, an authentic interaction, compassionate listening, a well-placed compliment, a helping hand, or a hug.

Kindness is fierce, brave, and daring. It is fearless and selfless, never to be mistaken for mere niceness.

## EDITOR'S



We are now halfway through the year, and the first six months have been both full and busy, as documented in KIT each month.

Our sacramental program for 2024 was completed in June with the reception of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, photos on page 7.

- •The Sacrament of Penance was celebrated during Lent on 14 March.
- •The Sacrament of Confirmation was celebrated during the Easter Season on 17 May, two days before Pentecost Sunday.
- •The Sacrament of the Eucharist was celebrated on the Feast of the Most Precious Body and Blood of Christ on 2 June.

June is traditionally the month of the Sacred Heart, with the feast day celebrated on the second Friday after Trinity Sunday, which this year fell on 7 June. This is an important feast day for the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, and we celebrated it with a morning tea following the 9:30 am mass. Photos of this event are featured on page 5.

We began the month with the Sacrament of the Eucharist and concluded with the Sacrament of Healing, the Anointing of the Sick, on 28 June. This mass, held at the later time of 11:00 am, was followed by a two-course lunch. We hold this mass and lunch three times a year, with the next celebration scheduled for Friday, 25 October.

Looking ahead to July, we anticipate Archbishop Christopher Prowse's pastoral visit. The Archbishop will be in our parish the weekend of July 5-7. He will visit the primary school on Friday, meet with members of the Pastoral Council, Finance Council, Liturgy Team, and SJACare on Saturday, and celebrate the Saturday vigil mass.

The various ministries have commenced their formation and training sessions. Hospitality held their session on 1 June, and the Lectors had theirs on 15 June. The Ministers of Communion formation session will be held on Sunday, 14 July.

Fr. Chung will be in Vietnam from 18-30 July to attend a discernment gathering of the Vietnamese community.

As we reflect on these past months and look forward to the exciting events ahead, let us find warmth in our community and in the spirit of togetherness and shared vision. Despite the freezing weather outside, our shared experiences and faith keep our hearts warm and our spirits high.

Stay safe, stay warm, and may the rest of the year be filled with blessings and joy.

## **Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus**

#### Introduction

Jules Chevalier msc founder of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, was inspired by St Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French nun, who shortly after she was professed, received a tremendous grace. She was praying in front of the Blessed Sacrament when she was filled with Jesus' presence, to the extent that she forgot where she was.

Jules Chevalier MSC, saw clearly that our Charism and our Spirituality is the answer to all the ills of our time. More than ever, in our day, we need a Spirituality of the heart; a spirituality of compassion, of love and of mission.

The MSC constitutions, approved by our Universal Church, have given us a mandate:

A mandate to..... 'be like Jesus who loved with a human heart'

A mandate to..... 'lead others to God with kindness and gentleness'

A mandate to..... 'unite all to Jesus and to free them from fear'

A mandate for..... 'justice and concern for all, especially the very poor'.

#### **Sacred Heart Devotion**

The heart is the centre of our being, and the seat of our emotions and love. The Sacred Heart of Jesus symbolizes his great love for humanity. Jesus initiated this devotion out of his great love for us.

#### Why the Heart?

Christ's physical heart symbolises his love for humanity. Devotion to the heart of Christ is a devotion to Christ's divine love.

#### Where did it start?

Early devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus can be traced to the 11th and 12th centuries at Benedictine and Cistercian monasteries in Europe.

#### World Consecration.

Pope Leo XIII consecrated the world to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in 1899, bringing about an increase in the devotion.

#### French Saints promote devotion.

During apparitions to St Margaret Mary Alacogue in the late 17th-century France, Christ is believed to have encouraged devotions to his Sacred Heart.

#### The 19th-century French School of Spirituality.

The French Wars of Religion and the French Revolution created civil chaos in 17th-to-19th-century France, but they also sowed the seeds for active periods of a spiritual renewal that still influence Catholicism today even far beyond the borders of France.

Fr Jules Chevalier msc, was influenced by St Margaret Mary and the French School of Spirituality. Chevalier came to know that the Sacred Heart is not a part of Jesus, it is all of who Jesus is. For Chevalier, God was and is all heart, all love, and nothing but love.

#### Devotion in practise.

Many Catholics receive the Eucharist on nine consecutive 1st Fridays consecrating themselves to the Sacred Heart.

St Margaret Mary always devoted an hour in prayer with the Blessed Sacrament the Thursday evening before a 1st Friday.

#### **Practices of the Sacred Heart Devotion**

Jesus asked for devotees of the Sacred Heart to make a holy hour on Thursday night. This commemorates the time Jesus suffered greatly in the Garden of Gethsemane and when he asked his closest apostles to stay with him. After finding his apostles asleep, he asked: "So, could you not watch with me one hour?" In his great suffering then and now, Jesus wants us to spend time with him and to be close to him.

He also asked for there to be a feast of the Sacred Heart on the Friday after Corpus Christi. This feast would be another opportunity to make reparation for all the offenses against the Eucharist.

Lastly, he requested that individuals receive Holy Communion on the First Friday of each month. He made generous promises to those who follow this devotion for nine months: "In the excess of the mercy of my heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour."




